This was another great year for Youth Foundation 3081 and Parkville College with young people working out how to make a difference in their community. 75 young people applied for grants totaling \$14,500, to carry out 15 projects. They celebrated their achievements at Latrobe University, showing off the work they had done to partners and supporters. In all, we estimate the program benefited over 350 members of the community in a positive way this year.

This year we worked with three VCAL student groups who all wanted to improve their community in different ways.

Work in Progress



Students were concerned that many young people experience mental ill health. They undertook some training with Headspace to build their own knowledge, and then set up and ran a stall at Malahang Festival, which involved fun 'feel good' activities and information about mental health , ensuring others know they are not alone.





Others wanted to improve the environment. Working with Banyule Council, students learnt about the importance of growing native plants. On the day of Malahang Festival, they too had a stall, sharing the information they had learnt and providing free native seedlings for the community, all planted in used biodegradable coffee cups.

Packs for the Homeless



After visiting the Salvos and finding out about homelessness and the reasons behind it, students set up and ran a bbq fund raiser. With the money they earnt plus the grant they raised with Youth Foundation, they were able to put together hygiene packs for the homeless.

Youth Foundation catapulted our project into a different stratosphere. It was huge to have an extra \$500 – it meant we could make 50 packs, rather than the 15 we had planned for. That was the real impact on the community – we made an extra 34 bags than we had initially planned. **11**
